Judging history: Exhibit offers early look at court Story and photos courtesy of the Chaska Herald

The Carver County and Chaska Historical Societies recently teamed up to create an exhibit on display in an alcove next to the court administration office at the Carver County Courthouse. The exhibit is titled, "Carver County's 'Lay'

Judges: Judges of Probate and Justices of the Peace." The exhibit explains how the judicial system was set up in our county's early history, with the probate judge and justice of the peace serving at the local level, and larger cases deferred to district court.

"What floored me was to find out that many judges were lay judges with no training of the law," said CCHS curator Larry Hutchings. "The

exhibit provides a brief look at a time when the justice system relied on individuals of good

character and community standing rather than legal training." Hutchings created the display and Lisa Oberski, of Chaska, researched the exhibit. She noted that one judge of probate in the 1890s, Julius Schaller, also worked as a shoemaker.

The exhibit includes a number of historical artifacts from the judge's chamber, back when it was located in Chaska's old Carver County Courthouse (currently the site of Klein Bank and the Chaska Post Office). Judge of Probate John Glaeser, who served from 1903 until 1925, forms the centerpiece of the exhibit. He was an insurance company president before becoming judge. Glaeser's desk and two filing cabinets are on display in the exhibit, along with a photo of him in his chambers behind the desk, with the cabinets in the background. Other items on display include handcuffs from the Carver County Jail, an official notary stamp, and a coat rack from the old courthouse.

The Carver County commissioners approved the funding for the project. One of the commissioners, Randy Maluchnik was on hand for the exhibit opening last

Thursday afternoon, as were Carver County and Chaska Historical Society directors Wendy Biorn and Tracy Swanson, Sheriff Bud Olson, First Judicial Judge (and CCHS board president) Mike Fahey, Hutchings and Oberski.

"We should honor the people that have come before," said Maluchnik, who also serves as the Carver County Historical Society county liaison.



Junior Curator Helps Illustrates Preschool Scavenger Hunt

The Carver County Historical Society Junior Curator program encourages students to think about historical events, people, and places as more than something that they read in a textbook. Our goal is to make students more aware of their place in history and encourage further exploration of objects, photos, and texts in the collection of the Historical Society.

A Junior Curator has the opportunity to:

- Choose an artifact, text, photo, person, or place to research and discover OR create a school, preschool, or family program based on an exhibit in the museum.
- Write an article about the object or program and its significance. The article will be published in the student's local newspaper.
- Tour behind the scenes at our museum to gain an understanding of how a museum operates and who works there.

Junior Curator Kaitlin Anderson, a ninth grade student at Waconia High School, recently helped Erin Anderson, Education Coordinator, update some of the images used in the scavenger hunts that are given to schools and families when they visit the museum. Kaitlin sketched and outlined several museum artifacts found on the scavenger hunts so that the images in the scavenger hunts better reflect the collection of the Historical Society. The purpose of the camp is to educate students in grades 3, 4, & 5 about environmental issues, as well as helping them explore the eco-history of Carver County. (Please see page 5 for more information about day camp activities.)

As a member of the Carver County Historical Society, we would like to invite you to participate in the eco-history program as a volunteer. We need many people to make these programs a success. Your participation is critical to this program's successful implementation. Feel free to forward this information on to anyone you feel would benefit this program. Please help this generation of Carver County students learn about what an important role they have to play in shaping the future of Carver County.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED:

- We are in search of **elder mentors** with whom students can practice oral history interviewing skills. It would entail participating in three short interviews with a group of students for one week. We are in need of six volunteer mentors each week. As an outreach effort, the camp will be held in multiple locations and the activity will be repeated three times. As an elder mentor, you do not have to participate in all three weeks of the program but we ask that you participate in all three sessions of one camp. The dates for the intergenerational interviews are as follows:
 - Week One (Waconia): June 9, 10, & 12
 - Week Two (Norwood-Young America): June 16, 17, & 19
 - Week Three (Watertown): July 7, 8, & 10
- We are in search of people who are willing to donate a morning or afternoon of their time to be a staff helper during the day camps. This could include anything from student supervision and assistance with projects and programs to bandaging scrapes and washing dishes. Shifts will be 4 hours long (8:30am-12:30pm and 12:30-4:30pm), and the dates and locations are listed on page 5. I am in need of 10 volunteers each week.
- We are in search of donations. Specifically, we are looking for long flowerboxes, small garden rakes and trowels, watering cans, potting soil, a grill basket, plain white t-shirts in various sizes, fabric paint, permanent markers, and, as always, lightly used school supplies (although we have plenty of crayons!).


