

### The History of Women's Hats



You don't need to look far to find the answers these and many other questions about hats. Hats are the topic of the new exhibit at the at the Willkommen Heritage Center in Norwood Young America.

Although women from an early age were always expected to have their heads covered by veils, kerchiefs, hoods or caps, it wasn't until the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> Century that women's structured hats began to be seen.

The word "Milliner", a maker of women's hats, was first recorded in 1529. Millinery has existed in Britain since the 1700's. By the mid 1800's, Swiss and Italian straws, imitation straw made from paper cardboard and horsehair were available to women, also at that time velvet and tulle were introduced. Plumassiers were feather workshops, where feathers were dyed and added to hats. Plumes have always been a status symbol and a sign of economic stability. During the first half of the 10<sup>th</sup> Century, the bonnet dominated women's fashion, large hats adorned with many ribbons, flowers, feathers and gauze trim.





## Hola mis amigos

I wish I knew Spanish. In college, I learned a little German and can still say, "Mein Deutsch ist nicht besonders gut." Translation, "My German is not very good." A friend of mine recently mentioned that he was traveling in Europe and two people were trying to communicate. One in Danish and the other in Swedish. The two languages have a common base, but the difficulty in communicating finally caused the two men to solve the problem in English. While English seems to have become a common language for communication, it is not the only one spoken in the United States. It was not long ago that church services, in Carver County, were held in German or Swedish.



A language that has been overlooked, in Carver County, is Spanish. Part of the reason could be that the Spanish speaking population immigrated to the U.S. much later than Europeans. The first Hispanic immigrants are recorded in the 1920 census. Raymond Cruz, his wife Concepcion and their daughter Mary arrived in 1918. They are re-

corded as being laborers at the sugar company in Chaska. Raymond and Concepcion were born in Mexico, Mary in Illinois. By 1930, the Hispanic population had increased to 60.

In order to interest our Spanish speaking population, Curator Eve Weipert, board member David Porath and volunteer Danielle Forner combined their skills to design a new traveling exhibit which is written in both Spanish and English. The exhibit is about migrant workers and the impact that Spanish speaking population had on this industry.

Migrant workers were an unseen population that worked for Gedney, Crystal and in the fields near Watertown. While

mostly, an unseen part of the population, they were and are an important part of the agricultural economics in the county.

This exhibit would not be possible without the help of Danielle Forner and her brother-in-law who translated into Spanish and David Porath who spent many hours researching. The exhibit is set to open early this summer in our temporary exhibit space. It will then travel to various places in the county. #### News from the Chaska Historical Society

- 1. The Chaska Historical Society will receive a \$7000 Legacy Grant to do research and create a display dealing with how innovative ideas cause economic and technological change-and how Chaska exemplifies this. Museology, a museum research, design and fabrication firm headed by Larry Hutchings, former Carver County Historical Society Curator, will put the display together.
- 2. Speaking of 7,000-That's how many photographs we have cataloged, entered into the PastPerfect computerized database, and archived in our collection. Sonja Deis is the volunteer responsible for the data entry.
- 3. The Society continues the arduous work of cataloging, numbering, sorting, photographing, and entering the information about each of the artifacts of the collection into PastPerfect as well. This project keeps a good half-dozen volunteers VERY busy, but there has been visible progress!
- 4. Jim Faber's *View from a Bench in City Square* historically informative columns (1990-1994) have been bound into book form and are available at the Chaska Historical Society for a donation of \$15. This 264-page book includes photographs from our collection. Its production was supported by a \$10,000 gift for this purpose from Chaska native Rodney Forristall.
