THE EMIGRANT'S SERIES **BOOK CLUB**

You've heard all about them, You have seen them. NOW, is your chance to read them. The Emigrants written by Swedish Author Vilhelm Moberg are coming to a book club near you.

Local Swedish farmer Andrew Peterson kept a daily diary from the time he left Sweden to about 2 days before his



death. This nearly 50 year diary provides a wonderful insight into the lives of early pioneer farmers and immigrants. After his death, the diaries were donated to the Minnesota Historical Society.

In the 1940's, Vilhelm Moberg discovered the diary at MNHS and used the information contained in them for the basis for a series of novels- The Emigrants (1949), Unto a Good Land (1952), The Settlers (1956) and The Last Letter Home (1959). The novels were published in English in 1951, 1954, and 1961, respectively. Two films, The Emigrants and The New Land were made from these books in the 1970's.

Join us as we explore these books, and the worlds of protagonists Karl Oskar and Kristina. Discover connections to Andrew Peterson as we explore one book per month.

Down on the Farm

December, January, and February are statistically the slower months of the year for us. If it weren't for the Annual Meeting, and the massive number of year end reports, budget planning, newsletters, yearly goal setting.... Wait, did I say it was slower? Now that we have closed on the farm, the number of permits and permissions needed almost boggle the mind. Let me give you a couple of examples, of common questions that are asked and their answers. It may help explain why the process is slower than most people expect or want.

When will the farm be open for tours? Well, it is open for general walk ons, but we don't encourage it. It is still private use property. For us to use it as public property, we need to apply for and receive a **Conditional Use Permit** from Laketown Township and Carver County. This is a lengthy process which was started in January. First, Laketown approved the permit. Then, the request was sent to the County who did all the magical legal stuff they have to do, such as publicizing it in the official county newspaper, the Chaska Herald. Once this is done, it goes to a committee for approval, then finally to the County Board. If they approve it, we can give official tours to the public, in early May.

How is the north barn restoration proceeding? As everyone knows we received an \$182,223 Legacy grant to finish the work on the north barn. When the ownership of the north barn changed to the CCHS, the use of the building changed from <u>private to public</u>. The original structural/engineering report five years ago was designed to have the building put back into <u>private</u> use. Now, it will be used for <u>public</u> use. This means that the structural weight load for the floors must be reinforced to 100 pounds per square inch. The short story is that a new **engineering report** and drawing had to be completed. This document was sent to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), for approval, which takes a month. With the drawings we are able to get a **building permit**. With the building permit we will be able to begin construction. After construction is complete, in about four months, the county inspector will take a look and if all passes, he will give an **occupancy permit**. Only then, can we have people enter the building.

Two More Grants!

In February, we received notice that two more Legacy grants were received by the CCHS. One for \$7612 is to microfilm four years of Carver County newspapers starting in 2008. It was in that year that the Minnesota Historical Society stopped microfilming. This grant is the first of several stages and will result in getting all the missing County newspapers microfilmed up to the current date. The last stage will allow us to microfilm several scrapbooks we have that are used regularly. This help preserve the original copies. This project will last about three months.



The second grant for \$9729 is to help alleviate the back load of collections items that have not completed accessioning process. This is phase one of three. Diane Ittel has had her position expanded to sort collections items to determine what stage they are in in the process. She will then work to make sure all the documents needed are completed and properly entered into Past Perfect. The end result will be easier access to collections items, and better documentation. Think of it as the same process we completed with our photo collection. Once all the documentation is done, we and visitors will be able to find things in our collection quickly and accurately.

All totaled since December, we have received a total of \$199,663 in grant funds. Most of which came from the Legacy Fund. The Minnesota Historical and Cultural Grants Program has been made possible by the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund through the vote of Minnesotans on November 4, 2008. Administered by the Minnesota Historical Society.
