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
New Exhibit Highlights Carver County's Agriculture History

One Busy Summer

Where did the summer go? Quilt groups, vacationing over the summer, are starting back up. Football is taking over the airwaves and boats are being taken out of the water for the winter. It seems it was just spring and now, old man winter is knocking on the door. Time moves faster the older we get. Isn't that what our grandparents told us when we were young? What made this summer move especially quickly is that we have been very busy with displays, children's camps, an audit, the fair, and various other activities.

The traveling exhibit, *Storyland*, surpassed our hopes in terms of number of visitors. During the display's run, 1132 people visited. For many years, we have been trying to make the museum more kid friendly. *Storyland* is the beginning of this effort. The exhibit, from the MN Children's Museum, was designed for children ages 0 through 8 and was very hands on. Several days at the end of August, we were flooded with groups from daycares visiting us. One day we were overtaken by approximately 100 children aged 5 and under. They came in groups of 25, but it truly illustrated the need for an exhibit such as this. The biggest problem came in comments asking what we will have next year. Good question, one which I don't currently have an answer for. One thing we can say is that we hit a target audience which has eluded us. Now that we have found what works, we have to find a way to continue the trend. Heidi would like to bring in *Grossology*, but it is a \$50K exhibit. Anyone know any big time sponsors?

It has been our policy to have an audit done every five years. This year we completed one ahead of schedule due to the size of Peterson Farm donation, which placed us in the mandatory audit category. Since one had been done last year, not even an adjustment was required.

Negotiations continue in regard to the Peterson Farm. We have received the right to use the driveway with the exception of tour buses. School buses and our vehicles are permitted. While we have this right, we ask that no one wander down the driveway. Please be respectful of owners of the front part of the farm. The part of the property we own still has estate property on it and is being monitored. We would hate to have someone arrested under the assumption of theft.

Our curator, Eve Weipert, has been busy. The one room school house display at the fair was very well received and sparked great conversations. The agriculture exhibit, *Minnesota Made*, has replaced *Hand-crafted* and several new displays are featured in the display cases in the hall outside the Veterans office. If you haven't visited in a while, stop out soon to view all the wonderful changes.

In September, I presented a session at the American Association of State and Local History conference in St. Paul. For the last year, I have been the co-chair for Marketing and Public Relations for the conference. This has been an honor and pure pleasure for me. We received a Legacy grant allowing Heidi and Eve to attend. I was to be there as well, but as a worker. Another Legacy grant was received to re-do our website.

Two Wars on the Frontier was released the end of July. We purchased 250 books and sold 170 copies by the end of August. The book was presented to the Governor's Task Force on the Civil War. At the presentation, we received an ovation, which was overwhelming. The book is available at Amazon.com, here at the CCHS, at the Chaska History Center, Mackenthun's, and Unearthed Arts in Waconia. I have had requests to stock it elsewhere, but haven't had the time to take it to the locations. The book will be available via e-book very soon.

Last but not least, my daughter was married the last day of the fair. I didn't think it was possible but with the help of a great team, both the wedding and the fair were perfect.

A busy summer, but a constructive one with lots of positive changes. Please visit us soon, if just to say hi.




